RAT Real Ale Train

I did mention briefly at one of the recent monthly meetings the possibility of a Saturday night out at the Watercress line. This is a preserved steam railway based at Alton and during the summer months they organise special evening outings combined with a local brewery serving real ale. My intention at the monthly meeting was to gauge the interest and a significant number of hands went up such that I felt it was worth pursuing.

Sue and I have been on a number of these trips with another circle of friends outside the Epsom Area Club. It appeals to both train buffs and beer drinkers and provides a good social night out. The steam line is based at Alton station where it starts on a platform next to the normal London rail service making the logistics very straight forward. The evening generally starts at about 7.15 pm when the steam train leaves for two complete runs the full length of the line arriving back at about 10.30, coordinating with the return mainline train in the London direction. One coach is dedicated to the bar where there are a number of different barrels of beer for you to try. At each station the train stops with plenty of time to get out and look at the workings and operation of a traditional steam railway. For those who tend to get peckish, there is also curry or chilli on offer at a very modest price.

Having been on these trips before, I feel that May is probably the best time of the year where we benefit from the long light evenings. So this is a proposed event for 2012. The cost of the evening, from Alton is £12 per person and that includes a free pint of beer (or other drink). From then on the beer is just £2 per pint, which, let's face it, is very reasonable. These trips are always very popular and sell out quite quickly so my plan is to buy a block of tickets. I have made enquiries regarding next year and although they have not fixed the exact dates, I have established that they are trying to keep the prices the same. I have also asked if we can book a complete coach to avoid the mad rush for seats. Trust me this can be the case. It is especially a problem for those who had an early start in the Railway Arms just down the road and left things a little late for boarding the train.

I thought that I would prime you up on this in plenty of time, because it will have to be a first come first served arrangement. I am unsure if they will let us book a complete carriage, but I will judge the interest and based on that result I will make a block booking. Unfortunately once the tickets are sold then we will not be able to add more numbers late in the day. I am however confident that it will be a great evening out.

1965 MK 2 MIDGET REBUILD PART 17

In my last article I told you that significant progress has been made. From a structural point of view, the basic body shell is now back together. The doors have been fitted and the boot and bonnet have been on and off more times than I thought could be possible. Some elements have been quite tricky because this shell had a history of very poor repairs covering metal that was still rusty. It is always better to start off with an original car that is very rusty than one that has been got at. At least in the latter case you know where things should line up. The object has been to check that everything fits before the shell is painted. I have spent a long time trying to fit the bright work around the front grille. This is a painful process because it is just polished aluminium and easily damaged. As you may remember this is a budget restoration and the wings were recovered from other vehicles and have their own issues following years of motoring incidents. The shapes of the wings are key to the correct fit of these bright "finishers", as they are called. Fitting these for the first time is not a good idea if the wings have just been painted.

I have spent some time checking and cleaning up many suspect areas on the body panels that need refining. There have been a number of areas that require surface preparation before the painting process takes place. This is a topic that I never seem to have mastered. I tend to put filler on and then rub it all off again in the attempt to get a perfect finish. I then worry if there is filler over paint. This will cause, what are called "sinks", a visible effect as a result of newly applied paint products softening the under layers. The sad thing is that it may not show up for many months and then it is quite obvious. As a relief from this activity I have put my mind to other parts that need attention such as the dashboard and windscreen. The dash had a couple of non standard extra holes that looked as if they had been cut out with a cold chisel. These had been welded up and it was now ready for a coat of wrinkle finish paint. This process needs to be undertaken at a fairly high temperature to get the best effect. I have done a few of these before using Sue's greenhouse on a nice sunny day, preferably when she is out. My brownie points are now quite low because I think the fumes killed most of her plants. The other disappointment was that I did not get quite the effect I was hoping for as it came out slightly too gloss. I resolved this with a quick thin flash of matt black. With the instruments cleaned up and refitted it looks quite reasonable.

Regarding the windscreen, I had a choice of a rather tatty version that was originally fitted to the car, or another spare screen from a 1967 car that I scrapped. The 67 car had stood for over 20 years and unfortunately some form of deposit had affected the aluminium finish in large spots. Both screens had issues but this dilemma was resolved when the original screen fell against the vice handle in my shed. You have all heard these stories of a small chip turning into something nasty, well it's true. One option is to send the screen surround away to a specialist and it comes back like brand new. You can however tidy up the aluminium yourself but it is a tedious job as it has a very hard coating that you have to break through. Once broken through the finish looks quite different to the rest, so you have to keep going and do it all. The abrasive that you use has to be very fine otherwise you will never get the scratches out and return to a beautiful finish. It is a fact of life that the finer it is, the longer it takes. I use a special preparation made up of old fashioned VIM mixed with either Brasso or Bluebell metal polish. 1000 or 1200 grade wet and dry is then dipped into this liquid and applied with much rubbing to the screen surround. You will see the hard coating coming off and with patience (which seems like 5 years) the blemishes will gradually fade. At this stage, the job is completed with a good polish up using Solvo Autosol which seems to have certain properties that preserves the finish. The final result depends on how much time you wish to spend, but I used this technique on my 1970 Midget about 10 years ago and it still looks good.

I am now returning to the body shell preparation and will keep you informed of any progress.

Duties	To provide a varied range of events covering runs, treasure hunts, driving tests, etc.
	Liaising with other committee members on matters affecting events.
	Finding suitable venues.
	Pre-booking where necessary.
	Planning layouts for driving tests.
	Awareness of safety needs at events and the appropriate insurance cover where applicable.
8. OCTAGONAL NEWS EDITOR	
Primary Role	Responsible for the notes of the committee meetings, production of the Octagonal News and updating of the Club Website
Duties	Produce and distribute notes of committee meetings.

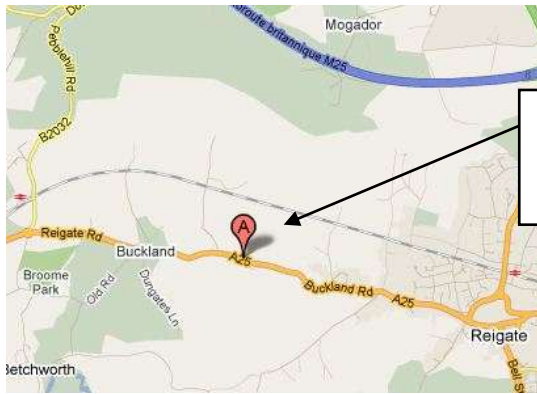

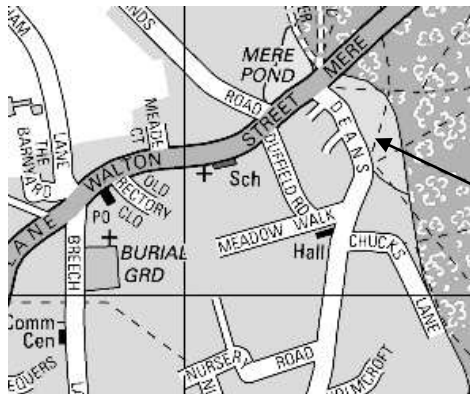
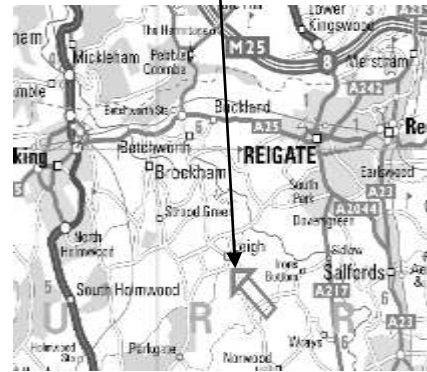
